- 30% **Ability to take college-level courses while in high school**
- 9% Performing up to grade level on state tests
- 3% Obtaining a lot of college scholarship money
- 8% Participation in cultural, club, student government or athletic activities.

4.0%	Unsure/no answer



Guiding principles

Adhering to the reporting categories base on the survey data that would allow the document to have some standardization in terms of format.

Allowing districts to choose the information and data they felt was most important to their communities in the construction of their profiles.

When using data for comparison purposes, benchmarking that data against international, national, state and or local norms and thereby avoiding local comparisons or lists resulting in rankings. As a result, no other school districts' name should appear within your QP.

Incorporating school improvements efforts into the document in order that a more comprehensive view of the district's efforts in those areas can be highlighted.

Assess what matters?

- An interest and desire in communities to assess schools on elements beyond what can be measured on standardized and state test scores.
- An opportunity for local engagement on what the community values in our school district.
- Improving communication and transparency with your stakeholders.
